Our beautiful coeducational school is situated on 56 hectares of prime river front land. It is a vibrant, centrally located high school in Logan City, with an enrolment of approximately 680 students in years 7 to 12, from a variety of cultural backgrounds.

In this way, we seek to provide a well-rounded education with opportunities for intellectual, social and emotional development throughout the six vital years of high school.

OUR CURRICULUM



Junior Secondary Program: Years 7 - 9

At Loganlea SHS, the junior secondary academic program (years 7 to 9) delivers the Australian Curriculum through the mandatory Learning Areas. This program is underpinned by the school's social and emotional learning program.

We see effective relationships and deep understandings of the learner as critical to learning success. As a result in year 7, we use a core teacher and home room approach to assist students with developing confidence in a familiar environment with a known group of peers.

In year 8, there is a small increase in the number of teachers and possible groups a student may experience. This provides opportunities to develop a wider network of learning relationships. In year 9, students transition to specialist teachers for each of their subjects and as a result have opportunities to further develop their learning networks.

Academic Program

In year 7, students will participate in all learning areas. These are: English, Social Science (including History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship, Economics and Business), Mathematics, Science, Health and Physical Education (HPE), Arts (two selected from Dance, Drama, Media, Music and Visual Art), Technology and LOTE (Chinese - Mandarin). The technology program involves students participating in Digital Technologies, Food and Fibre Production, Materials Technology and Food Specialisation.

In year 8, students will participate in all learning areas. These are: English, Social Science (including History, Geography, Civics and Citizenship, Economics and Business), Mathematics, Science, the Arts, LOTE (Chinese - Mandarin) and Health and Physical Education (HPE). Within the Science learning area, all students will study aspects of agriculture.

The Arts learning area involves students selecting two from Dance, Drama, Visual Art and Music to study. The technology program involves students participating in, Food and Fibre Production, Digital Technologies, Engineering Principles and Food Specialisation.

In year 9, students study English, Maths, Science (with embedded elements of Agriculture), Social sciences, and begin an individualized learning pathway by selecting three additional subjects from, Technology, the Arts, Health & Physical Education and LOTE (Chinese -Mandarin).

Social and Emotional Learning

In the Junior Secondary program, Social and Emotional Learning is embedded within the academic program but is also developed through the schools' Pastoral Care program designed to meet cohort specific developmental needs. In addition to this, a wide range of activities are offered in conjunction with the academic calendar, to give all students a variety of ways in which to learn and / or interact positively with one another. Activities may include Mentoring and Rock and Water.

OUR CURRICULUM



Senior Secondary: Years 10 – 12

Loganlea SHS builds the intellectual, social and leadership capacity of our young adults, achieving this through one of the widest range of academic and vocational offerings in the Logan-Albert Beaudesert district. The focus of the senior years is to capture a passion for education that will develop into life-long learning for our students. Students can work towards an ATAR and/or a Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) or Queensland Certificate of Individual Attainment (QCIA).

Academic Program

In Year 10, students will study the following subjects from the Australian Curriculum: English, Maths, Science, History, three elective area subjects and Certificate II in Skills for Work and Vocation Pathways, as part of their wider preparation for further senior study. Electives include subjects within: Arts (Music, Dance, Drama, Media or Visual Art); Health (Health & Physical Education, Health & Lifestyle), Science (Animal Husbandry, Introduction to Senior Sciences), Social Sciences (Geography, Business) and Technologies (Digital Technologies, Pre-furnishing, Pre-construction, Pre-engineering). Students can also make an early start on nationally recognised Vocational Education Qualifications which will contribute towards their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) by selecting a Certificate course (listed below) as an elective area of study. In addition, students may seek a School-based Apprenticeship or Traineeship in an area of interest. Year 10 students are supported to complete a Student Education and Training Plan (SET p) which examines their future career and study goals. This plan informs students' subject selection for the final two years of senior study.

In Year 11 & Year 12, students may elect to complete a:

- Course of study leading to university entrance (General Subjects and Applied Subjects via an Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR)
- Course of study leading to work comprised of General and/or Applied and/or school based VET certificates.
- Personalised pathway comprising a range of school based study, training and/or work with external providers (including apprenticeships or school based traineeships organised through the "Connections" office), or a combination of school subjects and functional support which may form the basis of a Queensland Certificate of Individual Achievement, QCIA.

Social and Emotional Learning

In the Senior Secondary programs, Social and Emotional Learning is embedded within the academic program and developed through the Pastoral Care program with a focus on decision making, leadership, study, examination skills and entry into the workforce.

OUR FACILITIES



When originally designed, Loganlea SHS had the good fortune to have been sited on one of the most attractive natural settings in the district. This fact, together with the size of the campus, contributes to the feeling of space and calm that is characteristic of the school community. Loganlea SHS has pursued a targeted facilities improvement program aligning with the latest developments in educational resources.

These features have enabled the school to create a variety of specialist teaching facilities that support the diversity of curriculum. Examples of this diversity include:

A Junior Secondary Precinct co-locating year 7 and 8 in an environment, featuring flexible learning spaces, colourful and modern furnishings, interactive technologies and physical resources to enhance learning. Toilets for junior secondary students are located within this block and are supervised by staff during break times.

Our state of the art science laboratories, re-developed with Building the Education Revolution funding, underpins an enquiry based approach to learning. This focus has increased both the engagement and skills of students pursuing careers in the sciences and scientific measurement areas.

As a Gateway School to Agribusiness, our 40 hectare agricultural training facility supports a range of plant and animal programs and uses industry specific machinery to enable students to develop skills in farm operations.

Knowledge House, our centre for excellence in indigenous education, is a shared cultural space designed as a meeting point for both indigenous and non-indigenous students and features a Community Yarning Circle and Bush Tucker garden.

Our dedicated Wellbeing Hub co-locates the variety of student support services personnel (listed overleaf) and ensures that students' needs are met.

Our Hospitality Trade Training Centre features an industry standard kitchen supporting back-of-house training to complete a Certificate II in Kitchen Operations. The Restaurant "Campfire Dreaming" Overlooks the community Yarning Circle and plays a significant role in supporting students to gain Certificate II in Hospitality.

Our E-learning Centre, re-developed through Building the Education Revolution funding, has moved the school forward from a paper bound library to a modern technology based space featuring online learning, e-books, and interactive technologies.

Our school sporting facilities feature extensive grass playing fields and multi-sport hard court surfaces, a new weights and fitness gymnasium, indoor sports centre, general play areas and handball courts.

Our newly refurbished "B" Block designed to meet the needs of our growing Performing Arts area, featuring new drama, dance and music teaching spaces and updated general teaching areas.

Our school also supports a wide range of additional specialist facilities including performing arts spaces such as the "Dance Shack", technology workshops developing a range of fabrication skills and dedicated Information Technology rooms supporting key Business, Digital Art and Film and Television video editing platforms.

Program Summary

The Agribusiness Star Program is open to students of all year levels. The program develops students' ability to lead and succeed in agribusiness through practical experience, industry partnerships and independent projects. Students play a vital role in the operation and maintenance of the school's farm, nursery and facilities, and in building the Agribusiness Star Program's reputation for excellence. Our Agribusiness teachers are passionate about the value of agriculture and environmental awareness to both the individual and the Australian economy. They are keen to share their considerable experience and enthusiasm.

Student Obligations

Eligibility for the Agribusiness Star Program is based on each student's record of attendance, behaviour, effort and academic achievement – and can include additional considerations such as agricultural experience, career interests, school and community service and leadership potential. Being part of a Star Program requires students to not only excel in school but also contribute to the wider community. Students who enter the program must commit to maintaining high standards in eligibility criteria, participation and community service.



HOSPITALITY EXCELLENCE



Program Summary

Students in the hospitality program in years 7 to 12, have the opportunity to experience learning in our Hospitality Trade Training Centre which has a commercial kitchen and a linked restaurant and bar. Training in both back and front of house, students will engage with Industry Partners, workshops and excursions to gain the necessary skills and knowledge to follow a career into the Food, Wine and Tourism Industry. In the Senior years, students have the opportunity to gain a Certificate II in Hospitality and Certificate II in Kitchen Operations.

Student Obligations

Students who apply for this program, must commit to maintaining a minimum academic standard, a high standard of behaviour and a commitment to the Hospitality Program.

SIGNATURE ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE



Program Summary

Loganlea State High School takes great pride in delivering curriculum catering to the diverse needs of all students. The Signature Program is a vehicle that provides students in year 7 to 12, opportunities to be engaged in the learning process with peers of a similar ability level in their timetabled CORE classes. Teachers are not only highly enthusiastic but also experienced with a passion for English, History, Geography, Science and Mathematics. The English and Humanities component focuses on reading and writing excellence. The Mathematics and Science component has a strong focus on higher order thinking skills and incorporates STEAM excellence (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts & Mathematics).

Student Obligations

Students who are offered a position in the Signature Program are expected to participate in four term projects (one per term), co-curricular excursions and are required to maintain A and/or B levels of achievement in all CORE subjects.



LOGANLEA DANCE COLLECTIVE



Program Summary

The Star Dance program is an innovative program to support the development of dance performance, choreographic, analytical and technical skills while promoting education through industry and community engagements. This program is offered to students in Grade 7 - 12, with previous dance training preferred. Students will engage with the viewing of live performances, extend their technique training, participate in workshops run by industry professionals, attend dance camps and have opportunities to perform at local and regional competitions. This program increases students' confidence and self-esteem while developing their creativity and expression in a safe and supportive learning environment.

Student Obligations

Students who apply for this program, must commit to maintaining a minimum academic standard, a high standard of behaviour and commitment to the Dance Program. Students will be expected to attend rehearsals and performances which occur outside school hours.

LIS - LOGANLEA INSTITUTE OF SPORT



Program Summary

The Loganlea Institute of Sport is an athletic development program for year 7 - 9 students with a keen interest in Sport and Athletics. LIS students are placed into a specialised Health & Physical Education and Care Class where they will participate in a specialised curriculum; focused upon strength training, fitness conditioning, specific sport training and general sport play. Students will also study theoretical aspects of high performance sport; including but not limited to fitness components, personalised gym programming, performance data analysis, and physical strength and fitness training techniques.

Student Obligations

The Loganlea Institute of Sport program is for the junior sporting leaders of the school. Students who apply for this program must commit to maintaining a minimum academic standard, a high standard of behaviour and a strong commitment to all school sporting platforms and specialised LIS sporting events.



LIS - NETBALL ACADEMY



Program Summary

The Loganlea Netball Academy strives to teach students skills to excel on and off the court. Students will be developed using the Netball Australia KNEE program to minimize injuries and create life long athletes. The Netball academy will not only focus on the body but the holistic growth of players focusing on sport psychology, nutrition and fostering leaders within the community. SMART training goal principles are used to ensure targeted athletic development of players. The academy will be an excellent pathway for students looking for a future in Health Services.

Student Obligations

The Loganlea Institute of Sport Netball academy program is for the junior sporting leaders of the school. Students who apply for this program must commit to maintaining a minimum academic standard, a high standard of behaviour. As well as this, students will be required to train at least once per week outside of school and commit to making weekend carnivals. It is expected that all students are playing at a club level, or playing in the Loganlea Club team at LCNA.

UPPER 90 ACADEMY



Program Summary

“The Upper 90 Academy is an elite training and coaching program designed to support talented male and female footballers. The program operates within the Loganlea Institute of Sport and supports students in their whole football development. Selected students are guided and supported in the process of developing a ‘whole footballer’, allowing the program to support more than just the ‘technical’ aspect of the game.”



Student Obligations

The Upper 90 is advertised as a leadership program and as such, the students are expected to maintain a high standard of behaviour and commitment to both school and Upper 90 Academy.

LYDP - LOGANLEA YOUTH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Program Summary

The **Loganlea Youth Development Program (LYDP)** is a leadership program for students in year 7 to 12 run by Loganlea State High School in partnership with Kirra Surf Lifesaving Club. In years 10 to 12, students complete three beach camps plus beach excursion days each year. During camps, students gain valuable awards and experience that benefit both themselves and their community. Students gain their Certificate II in Public Safety (Bronze Medallion) as part of the summer program. After they receive this award, they are expected to patrol Kirra beach on weekends during the surf season. Students also gain their First Aid Certificate, CPR Certificate, Advanced Resuscitation Certificate and IRB Crewman certificate.



Student Obligations

LYDP is advertised as a leadership program and as such, the students are expected to maintain a high standard of behaviour and commitment to both school and the Surf Lifesaving Club.

INFORMATION

UNIFORM POLICY



Loganlea State High School has a uniform policy which has been developed in consultation with the P&C Association. It is our school community's belief that a school uniform is an important part of a student's life at the school.

Some of the reasons for this belief are because a school uniform:

- avoids competition between students to be dressed in expensive, brand name clothes;
- ensures that students are dressed in clothes that are appropriate for learning activities;
- creates a good impression of students and the school to the wider community;
- easily identifies intruders to the school when all others are in uniform;
- and, complies with Workplace Health and Safety requirements. In particular activities in Art, Industrial Technology, Agriculture, Hospitality and Science require impervious shoes to protect the feet in the event of a chemical spill. As such the school has chosen to apply that standard to all students in all classes .

Parents and students need to ensure that:

- Students must have enough items of uniform to be properly dressed every day
- Students are to wear the entire formal or sports uniform at any one time (but not a combination of both)
- Jewellery is limited to a watch, one rubber charity wrist band worn on the wrist, and two studs or sleepers in the ears. Sleepers are to be smaller than a 5 cent piece and studs smaller than 3 mm in diameter.
- Other piercings are not allowed apart from a small, clear plastic retainer
- Visible make-up is not to be worn
- Boys must be cleanly shaven, or with facial hair neatly trimmed
- Students' hair is to be natural in colour and appearance, conservative in style and should be neatly groomed at all times
- Students nails are to be short, neatly trimmed and without coloured nail polish
- Every student has a school jumper or jacket by the beginning of Term 2
- Any clothing worn under the school uniform is not to be visible
- Uniform shoes are to be entirely black, impervious and polishable leather or vinyl shoes that do not rise more than 2 cm above the ankle and have a heel lower than 2.5 cm
- Only "Loganlea" scarves may be worn as optional winter uniform items
- Head dress worn for religious or cultural reasons is to be plain green, black or white.

Other Uniform Policies

1. In the senior school (grades 10 to 12) the polo shirts are part of the sports uniform only and as such may only be worn with sports shorts.
2. In the senior formal uniform the tie is a compulsory element
3. Students with genuine religious, cultural or medical considerations may discuss their particular concerns with the Principal. As such, if exemption to the uniform policy is granted, the student will carry a note signed by the principal, in their student diaries.
4. Students in years 10 – 12 are to wear formal uniforms every Monday and to all school excursions, unless advised otherwise by the excursion coordinator
5. Alternate Loganlea SHS STAR program uniforms may only be worn on Fridays and to STAR program classes.

Please note students may face disciplinary action for repeated breaches of uniform policy or wilful refusal to comply with the school dress code.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

The Loganlea State High School community acknowledges the role of Information Technology as a key to successful life-long learning. The school boasts a state of the art technology platform, a one-to-one ratio of students to electronic devices and promotes acceptable IT use within the framework of students as Safe, Respectful Learners.

In order to maximize the potential of technological innovation and learning opportunities for every student, where appropriate, students' personal electronic devices are incorporated into class activities. However, to assist students to focus on their learning, when not explicitly linked to class work, mobile phones and other electronic devices **must be turned off and out of sight during school hours (including at lunchtimes).**

OUR TRANSPORT OPTIONS



Loganlea SHS is conveniently located to maximise a variety of transport options to and from the school. Although general information is provided following, for more detailed public transport routes and timetables, parents should contact Translink. Students travelling to and from the school have an accountability to uphold the Loganlea SHS Responsible Behaviour Plan for Students and the Queensland Transport Code of Conduct. The Code of Conduct includes procedures for bus operators and drivers to follow when managing all behaviour issues associated with school bus travel.

Trains

Loganlea SHS is located an easy 5 minute walk from the Loganlea train station. Regular services (at least every 15 minutes) run from both the North and South of this station. For the latest information contact Translink or visit their website www.translink.com.au.

Buses

A number of school bus services operate runs to Loganlea SHS. Parents should access the Logan Coaches website for the latest information. Clark's Bus Service also operate runs to Loganlea SHS. For further information parents are requested to contact Clark's on 3200 9606, or access the journey planner tool through the Translink website.

Cars

When parents drop off their children at school they are asked to please access either the cul-de-sac entrance at Valencia St, or the area approaching the Neridah St entrance. Parents with appointments at the administration building are invited to use parking within the Neridah St entrance, but due to safety concerns and the limited number of spaces available, requested not to use the drive way and turning circle as a drop-off for students.

Bicycles

Students are welcome to use bicycles to travel to and from the school, but the school does not assume liability for any loss or damage to bikes when on the school property. Bicycle racks are located at the Valencia St entrance near the Home Economics block. Although this area is monitored by constant video surveillance, it will be parents' and students' responsibility to ensure bikes are adequately secured in this area. Students are advised to ensure that they own and use a bike lock of reasonable quality.

Scooters and Skateboards


Due to student safety and concerns regarding secure storage of these items, skateboards and scooters are not considered as valid forms of transport and are strictly banned within the school grounds. Students who breach this rule will have the board or scooter confiscated. In a similar method as the electronic devices and jewellery policy, breaches of this rule will, through communication with parents and students, be dealt with under the Responsible Behaviour Plan for students. Repeated confiscation of such items may result in behaviour consequences such as detentions or suspension.
